Organs involved: digestive system

<u>Effects</u>: Galactogogue, carminative, antibacterial, antispasmodic.

<u>Active ingredients</u>: Essential oils (anethol and estragole), flavonoids, coumarin.

<u>Indications</u> : **Internal use:** Dyspepsia, bloating or flatulence, colic.

External use: Greasy cough, lice.

Indications after the childbirth:

Green anise also promotes, like fennel, the rise of milk after childbirth. It is associated generally with the fennel and are taken in the form of herb tea.

Side effects:

Allergies -> do not take if you have allergies. Skin problems, gastrointestinal problems.

Pregnancy (if used internally as an essential oil), children under 6 years. Allergy (especially to anethol).
